• RFQ ISSUED FOR Invasive Species Strategic Framework

Missoula County, in association with the Montana Invasive Species Advisory Council, is issuing a Request for Qualification ("RFQ") to select a natural resource consultant to aid in the development of the Montana All-Taxa Invasive Species Strategic Framework.

The purpose of this plan is to provide a roadmap and timeline with prioritized short-term and long-term actions aimed to improve coordination, increase capacity, and decrease duplication of efforts for invasive species programs across Montana. The selected consultant will work with both the County and the Council to gather and organize the information necessary for the strategic plan.

• Western Governor's policy statement on invasive species (6/14/16)

Western Governors' Association Policy Resolution 2016-05: Western Governors support coordinated invasive species management including early detection and rapid response programs to ensure that actions result in more onthe-ground prevention, management and eradication. Governors also call for increased accountability and oversight of federal invasive species programs and support the creation of a west-wide species inventory, including the development of data management standards, formats and protocols. <u>Get the policy here</u>...

GOVERNOR BULLOCK JOINS Western State Governors to Oppose VIDA

Western governors are working together to urge Congress to reject the *Vessel Incident Discharge Act* (VIDA). VIDA would dramatically weaken or remove existing state laws around the country that protect our states' waters against the continual threat of aquatic invasive species and water pollution. It would instead impose an insufficient nationwide standard, enforced by the U.S. Coast Guard.

WESTERN CANADA INVASIVE SPECIES Agreement coordinates fight against invasive mussels

The Western Canada Invasive Species Agreement was recently signed by British Columbia, Alberta, Yukon, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. It is a coordinated regional defense against invasive species with an initial focus on aquatic invasive species including quagga and zebra mussels.<u>Read the news release</u>
