- Measures the change









- 5) Establish centralized database including links to U.S.
- 6) Support bi-annual National Forum and national level Bulletin or listserve
- 7) Re-invest in partnership programs aligned to national campaigns and priorities (i.e. IASPP)


- Increase the profile of AISC




