

#### Impacts of invasive species


- Second biggest threat to biodiversity
- Cost Alberta over \$2.1 billion each year (AISC 2022 extrapolation from McClay et al. 2004)

#### Invasive species cost \$1.2 trillion since 1960 globally



#### Alberta Context

- Weed Control Act 75 regulated invasive plant species
  - Current discussions about changes
- Agriculture Pests Act native and non-native pest species
- Alberta Fisheries Act 52 prohibited aquatic invasive species
  - Fines for failing to stop at watercraft inspection stations, failing to pull the plug and for intentional releases of AIS

#### Aquatic Invasives

- Zebra and quagga mussels
  - Alberta remains invasive mussel free
  - 1mussel-fouleded boats intercepted in 2022 (as of Sept)
- Spread of current infestations (e.g., Prussian carp)
- Eurasian watermilfoil
- Whirling disease



#### Invasive plants

New invaders (localized):

- Garlic mustard
- Sulfur cinquefoil
- Phragmites
- Ventenata

Invaders that are gaining ground


- Downy brome
- Spotted knapweed
- Flowering rush
- Invasive hawkweeds
- Etc.






#### Wild Boar at Large

- Considered a pest only when 'at large' no provincial prohibition
- Bounty program from 2008-2017 (1,000 kills)
- Current distribution





# Wild Boar at Large

- Professional trapping program
- More outreach!





Feral pigs, also known as wild boar at large, are one of the **most damaging invasive species** in North America.

#### Hunting is not an effective control option.

#### Wild Boar Case Study

Woodlands County

- Ear bounty program 2008-2015 236 bounties collected (avg of **30 pigs/year**)
- Professional trapping 2019-2021 years - 210 animals removed (avg of 70 pigs/year)



#### **Future Direction**

- AB Invasive Species Council Strategic Plan/Action Plan
- Research for new biocontrol agents (common tansy, oxeye daisy)
- Economic impacts of invasive species in AB \$2.1 billion (AISC 2022)
- Asking for increased investment in prevention efforts

### A Little Good News

- Professional trapping of wild boar at large is working
- Potash now registered as a molluscicide in Canada as of June 2022
- EDRR efforts (e.g., sulfur cinquefoil and garlic mustard, etc.) – invisible success stories!
- Expanding our audience all the time with new approches
